CDA to begin seeking community input on Atlas Waterfront



The City of Coeur d'Alene and CDA 2030 are inviting a diverse array of community organizations to share their thoughts on the Atlas Waterfront Project as a first step to assess the property's potential.

Coeur d'Alene officials will finalize purchase of the former Atlas Mill site by May 2018, and hope to utilize the 47-acre property to create permanent public water access and spur economic development initiatives.

The community input process begins with a Community Organization Representative (COR) Vision meeting planned for February 2018. The COR Vision meeting will be facilitated by non-profit community organization CDA 2030. Groups are being identified based on themes within CDA 2030's Community Vision Document. background and experience: I've worked for the City of CDA for over 20 years. The last 9 years I have been lucky enough to be the City's GIS Coordinator. Previous experience included testing software and writing documentation for a local software company. In addition, I was a police dispatcher for many years.

What are your current duties and responsibilities: Most things GIS (Geographic Information Systems). I create, maintain and develop the City's enterprise GIS. It can include data input to developing map applications for staff and the public. The City has invested a great deal in time and money to better track and analyze spatial data. This enterprise system makes geographic information available to staff and the public with an internet connection.

How does GIS relate to the average, every day citizen? GIS is a better way to keep records that are located based. Everyone uses GIS, in its simple capacities using maps to advanced analytics. GIS is two and three dimensional data — folks aren't content with having a written address, they want a map to visually show the location. We want statistics about a location and require other vital information to show up on a map to better make decisions. Whether it is shopping for a house in a low-crime

Less than two decades ago we were limited to low-resolution aerial photographs that we could not simply zoom in to view better detail. Now, we can use an online map and change extents to view many features that we take for granted. The City and County have invested much in the way of yearly aerial imagery. We are very fortunate to have a system in place that acquires this data on an annual basis. The City has many [online maps](#) for the public to use for various purposes — from viewing public art to elevation profiles.

What do you love about Coeur d'Alene and North Idaho?

The scenery and the people. The traffic is much more bearable here than other places I've lived. Coeur d'Alene has changed quite a bit but it still remains a great place to live.
