City Opens Glass Drop-Off Collection Bins

The City began accepting used glass at two locations on April 1 as part of its glass reuse program. Glass can be dropped off by

residents at the parking lots in Cherry Hill Park, 1525 E. Hazel Ave., and Bluegrass Park, 6056 N. Courcelles Collection efforts have Parkway. based community begun on feedback. Depots for collection are utilized instead of curbside pickup glass because can break and intermingle with recyclables like paper or cardboard. Broken glass in



the bins makes the other materials unusable and unable to be recycled. Shards of glass also pose a safety risk to solid waste workers and can cause safety risks on neighborhood streets or sidewalks. The glass from the drop off collection program will be hauled to a crusher. The crushed glass will be used as a soil amendment or for any other practical and affordable reuses. CDA Awarded \$78,000 for Flashing Crosswalk Signs

The City of Coeur d'Alene has been awarded \$78,000 to place flashing crosswalk signs at seven locations throughout the community. The pedestrian-activated signs, called Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons are being installed in areas where the City has experienced pedestrian or bicycle vs. vehicle collisions. Susan Wolf: Spring Cleaning CDA City Streets in Her "Rolling Office"

Tell us a little bit about your background and experience: I was

City Crews Prune Trees in Preparation for Street Maintenance



A Parks & Recreation Department crew is pruning trees along some city streets in preparation for street surface overlay work that will be done this summer. By pruning low-hanging branches back to a major branch of the tree trunk, the crew will be providing at least 14 feet of clearance over the street. This clearance will help prevent damage to both trees and street resurfacing

I do go home every day dirty and am thankful for the hot shower waiting for me at home!

Department do during the warm weather season? A lot happens in the department and every day is different. Seasonal patching of the streets, stormwater

Upcoming Road Closures for Utility Construction in Fort Grounds Area
