



Protecting Public Health Through Wastewater Standards



Wastewater treatment often goes unnoticed by many, yet it plays a critical role in a community's well-being. Situated along the banks of the Spokane River, the City operates a state-of-the-art treatment plant, diligently processing all of its wastewater. Ensuring the effectiveness of this facility falls under the jurisdiction of the State of Idaho Department of Environmental Quality, delegated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Their task is to verify that the City's treatment facility adheres to federal, state, and local standards. But why do these standards matter to the community?

Standards protect public health by ensuring efficient treatment and minimizing the risk of harmful pollutants affecting the community. In addition, standards contribute to environmental preservation by preventing contamination and safeguarding the delicate ecosystems

of the Spokane River, along with the biodiversity it supports. Moreover, these standards hold the City accountable, as compliance inspections verify adherence to regulations. Early detection of issues during inspections allows for prompt fixes, which can prevent potential environmental incidents.

Finally, transparency is key. Public awareness of inspection findings fosters trust and encourages community engagement in environmental stewardship efforts.

In January, the State's Department of Environmental Quality conducted a critical inspection of the City's Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility. The City is proud to report that no violations or findings of concern were noted regarding these important standards. The

outcome speaks to the professionalism of the Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility staff and the dedication the Department has to ensuring the health and well-being of the community and environment.



Coeur d'Alene Police Department's School Resource Officer Program

The Coeur d'Alene Police Department has partnered with the Coeur d'Alene School District 271 for decades to have School Resource Officers (SROs) in most area schools and as a result, tens of thousands of local kids have grown up with police officers positively impacting their lives. The Police Department currently has nine (9) SROs filling assignments at three (3) Coeur d'Alene (CDA) high schools, three (3) CDA middle schools and at North Idaho College. Additionally, two (2) SROs are assigned to rotate through the eight (8) local elementary schools.

A SRO is a sworn police officer assigned to a school on a full-time basis. Even though SROs have many responsibilities, the three major roles are safety and security for students and staff, being a positive role model for students, and enforcing laws.

Having a police officer at school full time provides reassurance students and staff. The knowledge that a SRO is there to protect students and staff alleviates worry and allows teachers to create an effective learning environment where students can grow and develop. Because they are already at the school, SRO can respond immediately to disruptive situations thereby reducing interruptions to the students' learning environments.



An equally important responsibility

for a SRO is to be a positive role model for students. Each SRO is assigned to a specific school and gets to know students personally because they work with them daily. SROs build trust with students, and many students confide in them about challenges they face in their lives. SROs recognize when students begin making poor life choices and work to intervene. They hold students accountable and coach students about the impact of poor decisions and the effect, both short and long term, on their lives. They continually work to help students make good decisions, positively affecting students long after they've graduated.

SROs enforce the law and hold students accountable when they break it. The purpose for a penalty when breaking the law is to invoke change in a student. In this process, SROs work with school administrators and prosecutors to determine the best way to help students make better decisions.



Fire Department Holds Annual Awards Banquet

On Saturday, March 23, 2024, the Coeur d'Alene Fire Department (Fire Department) held its Annual Awards Banquet at the Hagadone Event Center. The Annual Awards Banquet is an opportunity for the Fire Department to share a night of recognition with its members, their families, the City Council and Mayor, and our community partners.

There was much to celebrate this year. The CDA Fire Department set a record for the number of emergency responses, having been called for service 10,022 times. Many stories were shared of difficult calls, which required skill and professionalism.

Fire Chief Thomas Greif reflected on his second year as the Fire Chief of the Fire Department. Having settled in to his new role, he looks forward to a future of fostering and building a premier Fire Department for the citizens and valued guests of the City of Coeur d'Alene. He laid out plans for completing a Strategic Plan using input from both the members of the Fire Department and community partners.

Engineer Josh Hoston was awarded Employee of the Year and the Union Service Award. Engineer Hoston was described as caring, professional, and a true brother to the Fire Department members and the fire service in Idaho and beyond. He is a true brother to all and he cares deeply for his family, our Fire Department and our community."
