

Mayor Hammond Stepping Down

Please join the City in wishing Mayor Jim Hammond the best as he steps down on August 31 from his role as Mayor. The Mayor and his wife will be relocating to Colorado to be closer to their youngest son and grandchildren.



Mayor Hammond has actively served communities in North Idaho for several

decades. He was elected as Mayor of the City of Coeur d'Alene in 2021. Previously, he served six years as an Idaho State Senator, five years as Mayor of Post Falls, nine years as a City Councilmember, and previously served as the City Administrator for Coeur d'Alene. His dedication to public service is demonstrated by his past membership on various Boards and Commissions, including the Planning and Zoning Commission, Idaho State Building Authority, Idaho State Board of Education, Education Commission of the States, Chairman of Idaho State Charter Commission, Idaho Racing Commission, Panhandle Area Council Board, Post Falls Chamber Board, United Way Board, Jobs Plus Board, Post Falls Food Bank Board, and Post Falls Education Foundation Board.


BEAT THE HEAT IN EXTREME WEATHER!

Something's Wrong with my Purple Leaf Plum

Prunus cerasifera, commonly known as a Purple Leaf Plum tree or Flowering Ornamental Plum tree, are beautiful in the spring with their bright purple flowers that seem to be among the first to bloom. Their purple leaves stand out all season long. These trees have been planted all throughout the Coeur d'Alene area and, if you happen to have one planted in your yard or a right-of-way location such as a grassy sidewalk strip or swale, you may be looking at it with concern, and rightly so. Although beautiful, these trees have many issues that led to their removal from the City's approved street tree planting list many years ago. These trees were extremely popular as street trees in the early to late 90's, and there is still a large population of Purple Leaf Plum trees in the City's Urban Forest. Some of the fatal flaws that often make them short-lived include:

- They are multi-stemmed by nature and have a poor structure. This makes the tree more prone to branch failure and most will have splitting trunks within 15-20 years of planting.
- A very shallow root system makes them prone to uprooting in wind events and storms.
- A plethora of diseases and pests target this tree, affecting its canopy and overall health.

Planting this tree is not recommended. It is also not permitted to be planted in right-of-way locations as street trees. This year, you may look at these trees and notice that they look dead or have a very weak canopy. Why? The City had a severe cold snap in late winter which greatly affected this species of tree. Because of their early bloom, the trees have borne the brunt of the damage from the cold snap, resulting in a tree that appears dead or has significant dieback. This, combined with some of the other pests and diseases that affect Purple Leaf Plum trees, has caused problems that will need to be addressed. Many trees will need to be removed and replaced, and others may need pruning to reduce the amount of dead wood. Continued on page 3.

If you have a tree that is in a condition similar to the tree pictured on the right, the best course of action is to contact the City of Coeur d'Alene's Urban Forestry office for assistance. Staff can assist with identifying the tree, its location (right-of-way or private property), and provide guidance on proper tree care to deal with the issue.

The Urban Forestry office is working to mitigate issues on City-owned/managed properties. The City, however, does not have a crew that can remove trees for homeowners from their private properties.

In addition, by ordinance, homeowners are responsible for trees located in public right-of-way locations abutting their property. The City does have a cost share program to assist with tree work as well as a tree service licensing program to help you find a company that can perform the work




safely and correctly. Before working on trees in the public right-of-way, you must contact the City and obtain a no-cost permit for right-of-way tree removals and pruning. 

Coeur d'Con




