City Purchases Atlas Waterfront

It's official. The 47-acre Atlas Waterfront property is now owned by the City of Coeur d'Alene! The City purchased the property for \$7,850,000.

Atlas Waterfront Earthwork Update

If you have seen or heard construction equipment going into and out of the Atlas Waterfront project recently, the reason is that Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) contractors are moving excess fill dirt from the I-90 construction project to the Atlas project site. The City was able to negotiate with the contractor to haul and compact the excess fill dirt, which is needed for future development of the Atlas Waterfront project.
