

Coeur d'Green Doing Its Magic at McEuen Park

The new grass at McEuen Park continues to grow greener with lots of TLC from the city's parks department. Crews recently spread 100 yards (the equivalent to about six dump truck loads) of fertilizer onto the popular park. Specifically, the parks department used "Coeur d'Green," a by-product of the city's



wastewater utility. The compost is made from de-watered biosolids from the treatment plant that are mixed with wood chips.


New Trail Lamps at Riverstone Park Save on Electricity and Maintenance

A nighttime stroll around Riverstone Park is made more pleasant by illuminated bollards that light the way. Recently, the city replaced the lighting mechanisms

department," says Jim, a 35-year city employee who heads up the water department. "It is nice to bask in the pride that the employees take in 'their' water system."

The city's water superintendent adds, "Working at the water department also provides interesting challenges — from working with regional water purveyors to plot the future of aquifer appropriations, to explaining to a caller that we do not add an air-triggered 'water thickening agent' (her sink was stopped up)."

Jim has seen vast changes since he started in the water department in 1993. At that time, there were 10,000 accounts and 158 miles of



water main. During his first year in the department the city pumped 2.1 billion gallons of water. Last year, there were 17,000 accounts, 284 miles of mains and the city pumped 3.9 billion gallons. That's growth.

Jim was hired by the city in 1978 as a civil engineer and promoted to city engineer in 1980, a post he held until 1993 when he joined the water department. In the past 21 years, the city has nearly doubled the number of wells serving the city, from four to nine. A tenth well in the rapidly growing northwest part of the city will open soon, (Continued on page 3)



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in 54 existing bollards with more efficient LED lamps. The new lighting system will reduce electricity costs by about 50 percent, according to Howard Gould, the city's building maintenance supervisor. Previously, the city was billed about \$300 a month for the electricity so the savings should amount to about \$150.00 per month.

In addition to the utility savings,

the new lamps will result in an annual reduction in maintenance labor costs of \$921 as replacement of the lamps is made much easier, according to an Energy Efficiency Improvements Evaluation Report produced by Avista. The LED lamps were purchased with assistance from a rebate allocated by Avista for the installation of LED lighting at McEuen Park.

making sure demands for water across our growing city are met.

An ample water supply is something every city resident can count on, even as those demands fluctuate considerably throughout the year. For example, in February, the city pumps 5 to 6 million gallons of water a day On a hot August day, that can increased to 30 million gallons. Once the new well (scheduled to go online in late November) begins operation, the city will have a capacity of 37 million gallons a day.

After all these years, Jim said he still loves working for the city and looks forward to coming to work. "It's a great job; every day I come to work knowing that people expect to get water — and every day we make it happen," Jim said.

New City Logo!

The Coeur d'Alene City Council has voted unanimously to adopt a new city logo.
