Safely Winterize Landscape Irrigation Systems

City of Coeur d'Alene water customers will soon start preparing their lawn and garden irrigation systems for the coming cold weather. In this area, the most common practice is to use compressed air to blow out the leftover water in the irrigation piping. When performed correctly, this can be an efficient method to prevent expensive damage to irrigation systems caused by freezing. If performed incorrectly, how-



ever, costly damage to backflow assemblies may occur. You also run the risk of contaminating not only your water, but that of your neighbors. The following guidelines will help provide protection to you and other community members from irrigation system contamination.

1. Make sure that the blow-off port where air is introduced into the irrigation system is downstream of your approved backflow assembly. Blow-off ports installed upstream of the backflow assembly may allow oil and contaminated air from the air compressor tank to be back pressured into your potable water service as well as the city water main. High pressure air introduced upstream of the backflow assembly may also damage the internal components of the assembly, resulting in the assembly not properly protecting our drinking water supply, as well as costly repair/replacement of the assembly.

2. If your irrigation system is protected by a pressure or atmospheric vacuum breaker, it must be removed before the introduction of compressed air. These assemblies may be damaged if subjected to air from either upstream or downstream of the assembly.

3. The City of Coeur d'Alene Municipal Code requires the backflow assembly to be installed with unions so it may be removed before the introduction of compressed air and stored inside for the winter. If the assembly was installed without unions and cannot be removed to prevent freezing, then it must be thoroughly drained.

4. Remember to perform your required annual backflow assembly test at spring start-up, no later than July 1, to ensure the assembly is operating correctly. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact Gary Alan Nolan in the City of Coeur d'Alene's Water Department at 208-769-2298.

Holiday Craft Fair - December 2





Tips to Prevent Package Theft This Holiday Season

It's that time of year when many people will have packages delivered to their home. An estimated 23 million Americans have had a package stolen from their front porch or mailbox. The following are some tips to help avoid being a victim of package theft:

- Have packages delivered to where you are, not to where you aren't. Consider having packages delivered to your office or place of employment instead of your home.
- Use tracking numbers and delivery notifications. Most major shipping companies offer this free service, and can send you a text or email when your package arrives.



- Ask family members, trusted neighbors and friends to accept deliveries on your behalf or to pick-up your packages.
- Request packages be placed in a less conspicuous spot, such as a side door or behind a planter or garbage can.
- Many shipping companies now allow you to request a delivery time or time frame schedule packages for when someone is home.
- Install a smart security camera at your front door.
- Request signature on delivery when possible.
- Some companies and shippers offer locker service or for packages to be held at the distribution center for pick-up.
- Keep an eye out for suspicious vehicles and people in your neighborhood and report suspicious activity to the Coeur d' Alene Police Department at 208-769-2320

Media Academy Fire Ops Program

The Coeur d'Alene Fire Department would like to thank those who recently participated in the latest Media Academy Fire Ops 101 Program on Friday, October 20, 2023.

The program is based on the International Association of Firefighters' "Fire Ops 101" program developed over a decade ago to show community leaders and elected officials what it takes to do the job of firefighter. The



program has been adapted into an opportunity for our personnel, including Public Information Officers and Company Officers, to meet local media partners and while engaging in a fun and difficult day of being a firefighter.

This year's participants were Maryssa Rillo with KXLY, Bill Buley with the CDA Press, Guy Tannenbaum from KHQ, and Amy Valadez, the Fire Department's Administrative Assistant. They had a full day of activities that included entering a live-fire scenario, performing a search and victim rescue in a smoky environment, cutting a car apart during an extrication drill, and performing CPR during a cardiac arrest. City of Coeur d'Alene LEAF-FEST Begins November 13th

DO:

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 13th, 2023 marks the start of the City of Coeur d'Alene's annualleaf pick-up program. Please be sure to *KEEP* leaves on your property until *Wednesday, November 1st*. After Wednesday the 1st, please rake your leaves and pine needles about one foot away from the gutter/curb line to allow for water drainage. City crews and equipment are limited, so we need your help. Leaves will be picked up only once. Please do not put leaves in the street after city crews have completed your area and <u>do not</u> include bagged leaves, branches, debris or trash.

Pick-up will start south of Sherman Avenue and move north. We expect completion before December 1st. Follow our progress on maps.cdaid.org/leaf

LEAF-FEST DO'S &

- KEEP leaves and needles on property until Wednesday, November 1st.
- Please move cars off the street if at all possible during leaf pick-up.
- Keep the leaves about one foot away from the curb line to allow drainage.
- Be alert for leaf pick-up equipment traveling through your neighborhood.
- Keep a safe distance away from leaf pick-up heavy equipment.
- Recognize that we have a tough job to do in a very short window between when the leaves fall and when the snow flies.
- City and private trucks are exempted from covering loads during the leaf pick-up period. Sweepers will follow city trucks to collect remaining/ excess leaves.

REMEMBER: Needles and Leaves ONLY! No branches, grass clippings or garden debris. NO GARBAGE

DO NOT:

- Place bagged leaves in the street.
- Mix branches, debris or other trash in with the leaves.
- Miss the deadline...We only have time for one pass.
