Message from Mayor Gookin

A Season of Change and Gratitude

February marks another important month of transition in our city. Following the departure of Police Chief White after 11 years of service, we now see long-term City Administrator and former Finance Director Troy Tymesen moving on. Looking ahead, Parks Director Bill Greenwood will retire in March, and Fire Chief Tom Greif will retire in April. As a result, 2026 is shaping up to be a year of meaningful change as we welcome new leadership across several departments.

Our Human Resources team is actively recruiting for these key positions, and by summertime we expect to see several new faces joining city staff. Throughout this transition, our commitment to high-quality city services remains strong, and our teams continue to serve the community with professionalism and dedication.

This winter has certainly been unusually mild. With warmer temperatures and little snow, February still leaves me wondering what surprises may be ahead. As my great-grandmother used to say, "As the days grow longer, the cold grows stronger." Old Man Winter has a way of packing a late punch when we least expect it.

Farewell Troy Tymesen



City Administrator Troy Tymesen will conclude 25 years of dedicated service to the City of Coeur d'Alene on February 20, 2026. Mr. Tymesen has served in key leadership roles since joining the organization in 2000, bringing with him more than a decade of banking and financial experience.

Mr. Tymesen first served as the Finance Director/Treasurer with the City and quickly took on additional roles in administration, assisting with property acquisitions and facilitating partnerships in special projects and programs with other agencies, businesses, and community organizations. He was promoted to City Administrator in 2018, and over the course of his career, he played a pivotal role in guiding the City's growth, overseeing long-term financial planning, and enhancing public services. Ensuring public safety was a priority, he was instrumental in helping shape Coeur d'Alene into a place where people will want to live, work and play.

Former Mayor Woody McEvers praised Mr. Tymesen's longstanding commitment to the City, noting his steady leadership and productive partnerships, and the importance he placed on building positive relationships with staff and the community. A tireless worker, he will be greatly missed by City officials and staff who have become accustomed to seeing him during his frequent visits to every City facility.

Share a bit about your background and experience.

I am a lifelong North Idaho resident who has lived and worked in Coeur d'Alene for many years. I earned my Juris Doctor from the University of Idaho College of Law and have practiced law since 2007, operating a private practice serving individuals and families throughout North Idaho. My professional experience includes regular work with courts, public agencies, and regulatory bodies, which has given me a practical understanding of how local government decisions affect residents, businesses, and property owners. I have also served on a county planning and zoning commission, where I participated in public hearings and land-use decision-making.



What drove you to seek Council appointment? What do you most look forward to about the job of a City Councilor?

I sought appointment to the City Council out of a desire to serve the community and contribute to thoughtful, steady local governance. I believe city government functions best when decisions are made transparently, grounded in law, and informed by public input. 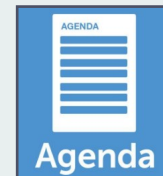

Farragut State Park Through the Years - Wednesday, February 11 at 5:30 pm

Step into the story of one of Idaho's most fascinating places with Park Ranger Errin Bair as she takes the audience on a captivating journey through time at the southern end of stunning Lake Pend Oreille. From the colossal forces of Glacial Lake Missoula and the Ice Age floods to the frontier days of Pend Oreille City and the iconic Mary Moody Steamboat, this month's lecture brings the region's past to life. Experience the dramatic transformation of the area during World War II, when the Farragut Naval Training Station became one of the nation's largest naval training centers. Then relive the excitement of the massive scouting events of the 1960s and 70s—including the influential 1965 Girl Scout Senior Roundup, which not only brought thousands of young women from around the country to the site, but also helped prove the land's ongoing value as a public gathering space. This pivotal moment helped set the stage for the creation of Farragut State Park, transforming the area into the beloved destination it is today.

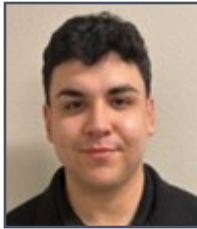

Forest Cemetery Windstorm Recovery and Spring Update

Following the City of Coeur d'Alene's (City) standard safety protocol, Forest Cemetery was closed on December 16, 2025, due to weather reports forecasting a significant wind event. Unfortunately, the storm caused extensive damage the following day. On December 17, 2025, the cemetery sustained the loss of 35 trees—some were completely uprooted, while others snapped off due to the high winds.

In the aftermath of the storm, Parks Department staff devoted more than 800 hours to cleanup and recovery efforts, working from the time the windstorm hit until the cemetery officially reopened on Friday, January 23. This work would not have been possible without the tremendous support of the Streets Department, which provided equipment, assisted with hauling logs to the City yard, and coordinated the donation of salvaged logs to Elder Help of North Idaho.



After a month-long closure, Forest Cemetery is once again open and looking much improved, though additional work remains. Staff will continue filling in holes, resetting headstones that were upended or displaced, and addressing remaining storm impacts.

As spring approaches, regular seasonal maintenance will resume alongside ongoing recovery work. These efforts include pruning, clearing flower beds, maintaining park tables, and continuing upkeep of downtown benches. As part of our agreement with the Downtown Association, cemetery staff provide repairs and the City appreciates the community's patience and support as the Park's Department works to fully restore Forest Cemetery following this historic wind event.

What about your family and interests?

My wife, Lisa Sheckler, is a local prosecutor, and we have one child, Mason, who was born and raised in Coeur d'Alene. Lisa's dad grew up on a dairy near Bonners Ferry, and my father grew up in Kellogg. My brother lives in Post Falls with his family, and my sister lives here in Coeur d'Alene with her family. My parents and several aunts and uncles live in or around Sandpoint.

With deep roots in North Idaho, my wife and I are committed to remaining engaged in the place we call home. The best part of living here is the people and the relationships we build over a lifetime. The second-best thing is the great outdoors. As a family, we value spending time with each other, outside. We go backpacking, fishing, sailing and skiing—but we are up for pretty much any outdoor activity.

What do you love most about Coeur d'Alene and North Idaho?

Coeur d'Alene and North Idaho offer a strong sense of community, natural beauty, and a shared commitment to preserving what makes the area unique: it is a great place to raise a family. What I love about North Idaho is what a small town it is. This means you have to treat people with respect—always. You never know when someone from years ago will be there to help you when you slide off the road, and need a pull out of the ditch. People have long memories, so it is best to never burn a bridge. The people we encounter each day—in the grocery store, on the road while stuck in traffic, at our jobs, or in public meetings—are the people we will spend our lives with, together in North Idaho. So, let's be good neighbors, and treat each other with kindness, grace and compassion—always. When we disagree, let's listen first, and understand each other, and then be committed to know that years from now, we will still be here, in the same community. So, the relationship is worth preserving. If we do well at preserving a respectful North Idaho culture, our grandchildren will grow up together, and they can raise their families here too. And that is what is the greatest thing about North Idaho: it's a wonderful place to have an extended family.

"Ron Jacobson brings stability and continuity during a period of leadership transition," Mayor Gookin says. "Ron's years of municipal service in Post Falls gives him a strong understanding of local government, regional partnerships, and community expectations. This experience allows him to step into the role quickly with minimal learning curve, ensuring that essential city services remain uninterrupted."

Mayor Gookin added, "Having a seasoned former Mayor in this interim role reinforces public confidence and keeps critical projects moving forward. His presence helps ensure a smooth transition, providing the community with consistent administrative guidance until a long-term appointment is made."

Mr. Jacobson's contract would end by July. The process of appointing a full-time City Administrator has yet to begin.
