Fire Department General Obligation (G. O.) Bond

Investing in Coeur d'Alene's Fire and Emergency Services

The City of Coeur d'Alene has experienced significant population growth, leading to a 35% increase in emergency calls since 2015. The surge in call volumes has placed considerable strain on the City's fire stations and equipment, highlighting the urgent need for upgrades to ensure the Coeur d'Alene Fire Department (CDAFD) can continue providing reliable and effective emergency responses.

Proposed Project and Bond Election

On May 20, City residents will vote on a bond election aimed at funding essential upgrades for CDAFD. This investment is crucial for maintaining the City's emergency response capabilities and ensuring the safety of its residents.

Fire Truck Replacements

Fire trucks typically serve approximately 10 years in frontline service, followed by 5 years in reserve capacity. As the vehicles age, they require frequent repairs which greatly reduces their reliability. The proposed bond includes a \$10 million dollar investment to replace 5 engines, 1 ladder truck, 1 heavy rescue truck and 2 command vehicles. This investment ensures CDAFD can continue delivering efficient and reliable emergency services. The replacements are vital for the CDAFD to ensure they can continue responding to both fire and emergency medical service calls, which constitute 75% of total calls. *Continued, page 2*

HIKING TRAILS IN AND AROUND COEUR D'ALENE

Spring is a great time to get out and explore the hiking trails in and around Coeur d'Alene. Here are just a few to get you inspired to get out and get moving!

Community Forest in Post Falls

A riverfront haven that's perfect for adventurers of all ages boasting over 10 miles of trail systems winding through lush landscapes.



Mineral Ridge Trail

Mineral Ridge National Recreational Trail is easily one of the most popular hiking trails in Coeur d'Alene. A nearly three-mile loop, reaching the summit of Mineral Ridge will give you some of the best views of Lake Coeur d'Alene.



Indian Cliffs Trail

The Indian Cliffs Trail is a three-mile round-trip hike near the town of Plummer. The trail begins on a flat bench above Lake Chatcolet, then climbs a tall, open ridge which offers wonderful views of Lake Chatcolet and the surrounding area.

Upgrading Fire Station No. 2

Fire Station No. 2, built in 1992, was originally designed for two firefighters but now accommodates five per shift and handles 35% of the City's emergency calls. The proposed \$6 million dollar investment will provide needed upgrades to Station No. 2, to meet its modern fire and EMS needs. The station will feature expanded apparatus bays for modern emergency vehicles, added safety features including a designated decontamination area, designated PPE storage, upgraded ventilation systems and improved living and working spaces for firefighters.

The current station is too small to support effective operations, including training and administrative duties. The proposed improvements include creating space for a battalion chief and a six-person crew, enhancing the CDAFD's ability to meet growing emergency needs. These upgrades will ensure that firefighters have the facilities necessary to perform their duties efficiently and safely.



Why is this bond election \$16,400,000?

In 2015, the CDAFD purchased new fire engines in the amount of \$580,000. Today, the same piece of apparatus is approximately \$1,200,000. In 2015, a new ladder truck was purchased for \$1,200,000 and today a new ladder truck is approximately \$2,400,000. Currently CDAFD does not have a reserve ladder truck and there is only one reserve fire engine that is 18 years old, and has already exceeded its useful life expectancy. The expected build time for new fire apparatus is approximately 36-48 months from the time of order, which makes securing the bond at this time even more crucial.

In 2017, CDAFD opened Fire Station No. 4, located at Atlas Rd & Hanley Ave at a cost of approximately \$1,500,000, or \$180/ square foot. Today, it is expected to cost approximately \$4,000,000, or \$400/ square foot to rebuild Station No. 2 which is located at Ramsey Rd & Kathleen Ave.

Bond Tax Impact

The interest rate on the issue of the proposed bond is anticipated to be 3.12% per annum, with the total repayment amount estimated at \$19,444,750 over the life of the bond. It includes \$16,400,000 in principal and \$3,044,750 in interest. The term of the bond will not exceed ten years from the date of issuance. The estimated average annual cost to taxpayers is \$16.07 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value, per year, based on current conditions. As of May 20, 2025, the total existing bonded indebtedness of the City, including accrued interest, is \$865,019.

Citizens are also invited to attend the public memorial at McEuen Park at 9:30 am.

Arts Commission Seeks Artists

The City of Coeur d'Alene Arts Commission is seeking artists to participate in its "ArtCurrents" program. Artists submit applications for placement of their sculptures around downtown Coeur d'Alene and Riverstone for a period of one (1) year, with an option to renew for a second year. The displayed works should be created and displayed with the intention of selling within the year, with the City of Coeur d'Alene receiving a 25% commission from the sale. The Arts Commission has set a minimum cost for the piece at \$7,000 with a maximum cost of \$30,000 to make the art accessible to a variety of buyers.

The selected artists or artist's teams will be paid a stipend of \$1,000.00 for the first year. A second stipend of \$1,000.00 may be paid to the artists at the start of the second year should the Arts Commission choose to retain the piece. ArtCurrents pieces are displayed along Sherman Avenue, Lakeside Avenue, City Park, and the Riverstone area.

Public art is a distinguishing part of our public history and our culture. It creates and enhances neighborhood and community identity. It adds to the visual landscape and character of the city. It turns ordinary spaces into community landmarks, promotes diverse dialogue and, most importantly, is accessible to everyone. ArtCurrents is looking for creative artists who capture the spirit and atmosphere of the environment in which we live. The Arts Commission is interested in seeing high quality, thoughtful art pieces with an emphasis on excellent craftsmanship. Pieces are encouraged which center on themes or interpretations of the Northwest in any form and are family-oriented. The artwork may be in any medium that will withstand the elements year-round and can be abstract or realistic. ArtCurrents provides high visibility outdoor gallery space for each piece chosen throughout high traffic streets, parks, and public spaces in town. The pieces will enrich the beauty of the city landscape while providing exposure to the artist with the intent of selling the piece.

Applications must be received through the CaFÉ website (www.callforentry.org) no later than 5:00 p.m. PST on June 30, 2025. The call is entitled: "Coeur d'Alene Art Currents 2025".

Installation of the artwork will begin in October.

Grant Funds Available

The City of Coeur d'Alene is currently accepting applications for the 2025 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program funding cycle of its Community Opportunity Grant (COG). Any for profit or nonprofit organization, or business may apply for the CDBG's Community Opportunity Grant for qualifying projects and services that benefit low- and moderate- income (LMI) people or neighborhoods in Coeur d'Alene. Applicants must be in compliance with federal, state, and local laws and regulations.


While the City has not received a funding notice from HUD, it is expected the 2025 allocation will be similar to last year's actual allocation of \$296,418. It is anticipated that there will be approximately \$81,644 available in Plan Year 2025 COG funding, and approximately \$36,900 available of remaining COG funding from prior plan years 2020-2022 available for eligible grant proposals. Of the total funding available, a maximum of 15% of the total Plan Year 2025 allocation, or \$34,400 will be available for public service type grants in the program year. Projects must further the goals of the City of Coeur d'Alene's 5-Year Consolidated Plan and meet at least one (1) National Objective as defined by HUD. Grant fund proposals shall be in an amount of at least \$20,000.

An Educational Workshop will be held in-person on **May 13, 2025, at 2:00 pm** To participate in the workshop, plan to attend in-person at City Hall, 710 E. Mullan Ave, Conference Room 6.

In the 1980s, he served on the Board of Directors for the Museum of North Idaho, and he currently serves as the District 1 Trustee to the Idaho State Historical Society.



Lithium-ion Battery Safety

Lithium-ion batteries are increasingly found in devices and systems that the public and first responders use or interact with daily. While these batteries provide an effective and efficient source of power, the likelihood of them overheating, catching on fire, and even leading to explosions increases when they are damaged or improperly used, charged, or stored. Below is a guide on how to handle lithium-ion batteries.

HOW TO HANDLE LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES

DO'S	DON'TS
 <p>Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing lab.</p>	 <p>Do not leave devices plugged in once fully charged.</p>
 <p>Only use the battery and charging cord designed for the device.</p>	 <p>Do not charge the device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.</p>
 <p>Keep devices and batteries at room temperature.</p>	 <p>Do not charge devices at temperatures below 32°F or above 105°F.</p>
 <p>Store batteries away from flammable objects.</p>	 <p>Do not discard lithium-ion batteries in the trash.</p>

FIRE PROTECTION SYSTEMS SAVE LIVES!

In addition to following the tips above, choosing to install and maintain fire and life safety systems can *save lives and protect property.*
